

Please arrive in the vestibule by 9:45 am and wear your Girl Scout uniform if you have one. Girls will sit as a group in the front pews.






## A Note From Mrs. McCabe...

### Our School Counselor

If your family is being affected by the current economic recession, don't forget to help your children understand what is going on in terms that are appropriate for their ages. It is almost for certain that children hear adult conversations and become anxious and worried about the family's economic woes.

Here are some ways to help your children through this difficult time:

1. Be careful how you talk about your money issues when your children are around. If you are getting emotional about your worsening financial situation, it will make them fearful. Keep your money conversations to scheduled times with your partner when the children are not around.
2. Initiate family discussions about the economy. Ask your children what they know about money matters, what they've learned at school and how they feel about the economic crisis. Encourage questions. This is a great opportunity to teach your children about economics, money management and coping tools. It's never too early to learn life skills.
3. If your family is feeling the impact of our economy, talk to your teen about some of the things you are doing to get through the crisis. Explain that you are watching your spending during these times and how this strategy can help keep your family afloat. Reassure your child that you are taking care of business, that everything is okay and that the recession is not permanent.
4. Don't underestimate or overestimate your child, especially the teens. Although being open about the family's financial situation is always a good idea and helps to lessen any fear and anxiety that comes from not knowing what's going on, remember to keep your discussions age appropriate.
5. Not having the usual amount of spending money, doesn't mean you can't have fun. Children, especially teens, have expensive taste and believe that in order to have fun you must have money to spend. Explain to them that it's not true and show them that fun doesn't necessarily have to cost a lot of money. Play games as a family. There are many board games out that the whole family can play. Go for walks. Watch TV shows. Bonding is an important part of being a family and this is a good opportunity to bond, have fun, share and laugh.
6. Remind your child that the family is not alone in their situation. Explain that many people are going through the exact same challenges. Talk about what the family can do to help reduce waste and cut the family's expenses. Let them see that through sacrifice and team work the family can get through the recession and be better for it!



# REQUESTS FOR TEACHERS STMS POLICY FOR 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR (Posting # 5 - FINAL POSTING)

The assignment of homerooms is done in the spring of the prior year. The goal of the collaborative decision by grade level teachers, departmental teachers, special services teachers, the principal and assistant principal is to build a class which will enable each individual child to have an academically successful year in a social environment that supports continued growth and development. The best possible attempts are made to provide a gender balance, a range of overall abilities and personalities, uniform class size and sensitivity to the number and nature of children receiving special services.

We, at St. Thomas More School, believe that **all** of our teachers are exceptional. Once in a while parents ask if they may request a particular teacher. We are asking that parents **do not make specific requests to have or not have a particular teacher**. We will, however, be more than happy to accept specific and relevant information which describes or supports a particular academic, pedagogical or social/emotional need of your child. **This information must be put in writing to the Principal prior to March**. Once again, we believe **all** of the members of the faculty at St. Thomas More School are **exceptional**, and although we welcome clarifying information, St. Thomas More School will **no longer** be able to accept specific requests for a teacher.

**Definition of a HOMEROOM:** Location where a student gathers for morning, lunch and dismissal prayer, attendance, lunch count. NO academic subject is taught in homeroom from grade 5 - 8. Due to limited classroom space, it is necessary to locate homerooms in locations such as the Library, Solar Room, etc. (Posting # 5 - FINAL POSTING)







# WellBits

**National Nutrition Month®** is a nutrition education and information campaign created annually in March by the American Dietetic Association. The campaign focuses attention on the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits. During this month, the WellBits column will focus on family nutrition topics.

For starters, to get the most nutrition for your family, focus on choosing foods that are full of vitamins, minerals, fiber, and are moderate in calorie count. This can best be accomplished by adding more fruits, vegetables, and whole grains to your diet. Here are 7 simple ways to easily accomplish that goal:

1. Since it's still Lent, why not add veggies to your pizza toppings. Try spinach, green peppers, tomatoes, mushrooms, and/or broccoli for nutrients that pack a big punch.
2. Add instant 'oatmeal' breakfasts a couple times per week. Sprinkle with dried cranberries/blueberries/raisins and a sprinkle of brown sugar. Prepare the oatmeal with low fat/skim milk to increase the calcium content.
3. Add pizzazz to your sandwiches and load on the veggies, just like they do at Subway.
4. Sneak in servings of wholesome veggies to your soup, meatloaf, pasta sauce, lasagna or casserole. Shred/grate the veggies (i.e. carrots/spinach, etc) and your kids will never know the difference.
5. Make stuffed omelets. Fold omelet over a layer of veggies and low fat cheese for a power filled breakfast.
6. Fruit smoothies are a great way to increase your daily consumption of fruits. Make them with frozen yogurt and/or low fat milk for added calcium.
7. Try crunchy veggies dipped in low-fat dressings instead of chips.

# The Scrutinies

of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults Celebrated on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent.

These very special rites are celebrated on the last three Sundays of Lent, at liturgies where the Elect are present. The Elect are those in our midst who are preparing for Baptism. Part of their journey to the font is that they have been received among us, the Rite of Acceptance, and they have been enrolled in the Book of the Elect in the Rite of Election.

Even if these rites are not celebrated at the liturgy we attend, or not celebrated in our parish or congregation at all, it can be wonderful to reflect upon the journey these Elect are making during Lent, as an inspiration and source of renewal for us in our journey.

These are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us. But they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We need to examine (scrutinize) how we are, the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin - in what we do and what we fail to do. We really need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers.

## Invitation to Silent Prayer

One of the most powerful moments of the Scrutinies is how they begin. After the homily, the Elect are invited to come forward with their sponsors and to kneel down. Then, the whole assembly is invited to pray for them in silence. It is a very solemn moment. This community has cared for these elect for some months now on their journey. We have sent them to reflect more and more deeply on the Word of God, and expressed to them our longing for the day on which they would join us at the table of the Lord. Now we pray for them in this sacred silence, deeply asking God to protect them and heal them in the weeks ahead.

## Intercessions for the Elect

We then pray out loud together for the Elect.

## Prayer of Exorcism

Then, we pray that they might be freed from the power of the Evil One and protected on their journey.

## The Laying On of Hands

In a silent ritual deliberately reminiscent of the rite used for ordination in the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the priest or deacon lays his hands for a brief moment on the head of each of the Elect. It is a solemn act of calling down the Spirit of Jesus to be with them and protect them.

## Dismissal of the Elect

The Elect are then sent forth to reflect upon the Word and this powerful gesture of love on the part of this community, that cares for them so deeply, with the love of Christ.

## The Period of Purification and Enlightenment

138 The period of purification and enlightenment, which the rite of election begins, customarily coincides with Lent. In the liturgy and liturgical catechesis of Lent the reminder of baptism already received or the preparation for its reception, as well as the theme of repentance, renew the entire community along with those being prepared to celebrate the paschal mystery, in which each of the elect will share through the sacraments of initiation. For both the elect and the local community, therefore, the Lenten season is a time for spiritual recollection in preparation for the celebration of the paschal mystery.

139 This is a period of more intense spiritual preparation, consisting more in interior reflection than in catechetical instruction, and is intended to purify the minds and hearts of the elect as they search their own consciences and do penance. This period is intended as well to enlighten the minds and hearts of the elect with a deeper knowledge of Christ the Savior.

## The Scrutinies

141 The scrutinies, which are solemnly celebrated on Sundays and are reinforced by an exorcism, are rites for self-searching and repentance and have above all a spiritual purpose. The scrutinies are meant to uncover, and then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all.

142 Because they are asking for the three sacraments of initiation, the elect must have the intention of achieving an intimate knowledge of Christ and his Church, and they are expected particularly to progress in genuine self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.

143 In order to inspire in the elect a desire for purification and redemption by Christ, three scrutinies are celebrated. By this means, first of all, the elect are instructed gradually about the mystery of sin, from which the whole world and every person longs to be delivered and thus saved from its present and future consequences. Second, their spirit is filled with Christ the Redeemer, who is the living water (gospel of the Samaritan woman in the first scrutiny), the light of the world (gospel of the man born blind in the second scrutiny), the resurrection and the life (gospel of Lazarus in the third scrutiny). From the first to the final scrutiny the elect should progress in their perception of sin and their desire for salvation.

144 In the rite of exorcism, the elect, who have already learned from the Church as their mother the mystery of deliverance from sin by Christ, are free from the effects of sin and from the influence of the devil. They receive new strength in the midst of their spiritual journey and they open their hearts to receive the gifts of the Savior.

145 The priest or deacon who is the presiding celebrant should carry out the celebration in such a way that the faithful in the assembly will also derive benefit from the liturgy of the scrutinies and join in the intercessions for the elect.
